# Reflection from Sr Carlene for the Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year C

# WISDOM OF HEART

In today's gospel (Lk 6: 39–45) we see that Jesus was a great teacher and story-teller. To get his points across and to re-inforce his lessons, he sometimes used <u>wisdom sayings and parables</u>. These are found in diverse places in Matthew's gospel, but Luke has selected a few of them and strung them together in the extract (6: 39–45) which is today's reading and part of his account of the Sermon on the Plain (Lk – chapter 6).

So... turning to today's gospel, we have Jesus instructing his disciples (and us!) With a touch of humour and use of a popular literary technique of the time, Jesus poses a probing question: "Can one <u>blind</u> person <u>guide</u> another?"

Moving us to think about <u>what and how we see</u>, Jesus the carpenter's son provokes us to <u>admit our own areas of blindness</u>. Hence, he reverts to exaggeration, staunchly condemning hypocrisy, and bidding us to "first take <u>the log</u> out" of our own eyes. Well may we pause and ask:

- Do we question the opinions we hold?'
- Are we cautious about where we look for guidance?
- Do we really take a good look at ourselves and our <u>true motives?</u>

Turning back to the gospel, we notice that between the two mini-parables about sight, Jesus sandwiches a verse of wisdom: "<u>a disciple is not above</u> <u>the teacher."</u> ... We get the message – some of us are on L-plates; others are on P-plates! Nevertheless, there is hope and opportunity for us all. Jesus adds that "everyone who is fully qualified will be like their teacher." Using the image of fruit trees, he points out good teachers can be recognised by <u>how</u> their teaching nourishes others and <u>how</u> their lives illustrate what they proclaim.

Jesus sums up his whole instruction saying, "it is <u>out of the abundance of</u> <u>the heart</u> that the mouth speaks."

• Perhaps we can begin by speaking less and listening more?

God of love, help us to remove the log in our own eyes so we may serve others more sincerely. Grant us the wisdom to listen compassionately, to judge gently, and to walk humbly along life's pathway, keeping our eyes on Jesus, our guide. Amen.

### First Reading: Sirach 27: 4-7

When a sieve is shaken, the refuse appears; so do one's faults when one speaks. The kiln tests the potter's vessels; so the test of the just person is in tribulation. Its fruits discloses the cultivation of a tree; so a person's speech discloses the cultivation of the mind. Do not praise someone before they speak, for this is the way the people are tested.

#### **Responsorial Psalm 91 (92): 2-3, 13-16.** R: Lord, it is good to give thanks to you.

It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to your name, O Most High; to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night. R.

The righteous flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a cedar in Lebanon. They are planted in the house of the Lord; they flourish in the courts of our God. R.

In old age they still produce fruit; they are always green and full of sap, showing that the Lord is upright; he is my rock, and there is no unrighteousness in him. R.

**Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15: 54-58** Brothers and sisters: When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain.

### Gospel: Luke 6: 39-45

Jesus told his disciples a parable: "Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully qualified will be like their teacher. Why do you see the speck in your neighbour's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbour, 'Friend, let me take out the speck in your eye,' when you yourself do not see the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbour's eye. No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. Out of the good treasure of the heart, the good person produces good, and out of evil treasure, the evil person produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks.

Thank you for standing with us, as we Unite Against Poverty this Lent.

In the Church our celebrations are like pearls. They start with an itch in an oyster. The oyster surrounds the itch with layers of mother of pearl, which eventually becomes the rounded pearl we prize. Lent develops in the same way. It began with the belief that God has forgiven our sins and given us life through the death and rising of Jesus. That led Christians to dedicate a special feast to celebrate Jesus' dying and rising. That was surrounded by layers of story, prayer and other Christian practices.

These included fasting, a regular part of Jewish and later Christian practice. Fasting marked seriousness. It was associated with acknowledging sin and communal renewal of faith. The fast was then surrounded by other stories relevant to Jesus' death. They included the story of God freeing the Jewish people from slavery in Egypt, which was celebrated in the Jewish feast of the Passover. The link to the Passover was also central in the Gospel story of Jesus' death.

The length of the Lent fast was also shaped by stories. The people of Israel spent forty years in the desert before entering the promised land. Jesus spent forty days fasting and praying in the desert for forty days before beginning his public ministry. In time the fast was lengthened from five weeks to forty days.

When Roman Empire tolerated Christianity and Christians returned to Jerusalem, another layer was added. During the Fast they celebrated Jesus' last days from his entrance to Jerusalem, to the Last Supper, imprisonment, and crucifixion. These ceremonies were gradually adopted by the rest of the Church.

A final layer was placed after Lent became the favoured time for people to prepare for Baptism at Easter. It symbolised their dying with Christ in baptism and rising to a new Christian life. During Lent, too, Christians also confessed publicly serious sins and dressed in sackcloth and ashes before being received back into the Church at Easter. This history is reflected in the sombre colours of Lent and in the sprinkling of ashes on Ash Wednesday, the final layer in the pearl of the celebration of Easter.

If Lent has grown like a pearl, it also brings together many journeys: first of all the large journey of God's journey with the human race through creation and through calling the people of Israel to be his own. It focuses especially on Jesus' journey with us on earth and particularly on his final journey to eat with his disciples, to the humiliation of arrest torture and death, and to rising from the dead.

Lent also marks our human journey of entering more deeply into God's journey with us through Christ. In our Lenten journey we ask ourselves what matters to us. We also reflect on God's calling to follow Jesus, on our sinfulness, and on how God overwhelmed our sins by the the gift of forgiveness. Lent is a journey of growing in love.

Finally, Lent is a shared journey. It is shared silently in our hearts in prayer. It is also shared in our association with people by reflecting together on the Gospel, joining with people who are preparing for Baptism, joining in recognising our weakness and receiving forgiveness, and by sharing in the joy and light of Easter. There the pearl layered in Lent is seen in its full lustre.
